Information Literacy Learning Objectives & Outcomes:

1. Determine the information need

Outcomes: Upon completion of information literacy instruction, students should be able to:

- a. Identify the services and different types of materials available at the library.
- b. Identify the information need by locating sources for selecting and articulating a topic of appropriate scope.
- c. Define the differences between print and electronic resources.
- d. Identify the types of information needed (example: books, journal articles, websites).

2. Access the information effectively and efficiently

Outcomes: Upon completion of information literacy instruction, students should be able to:

- a. Search the library catalog, identify a call number, and find a book on the shelf.
- b. Identify library databases and demonstrate effective basic searching techniques (example: discovery tool, proquest, ebscohost)
- c. Request books, access eBooks, download full-text articles, and save searches.
- d. Create an effective search strategy by brainstorming for keywords
- e. Refine and narrow searches by applying Boolean Operators, truncating, and using subject headings or other limiting features appropriate to the database.

3. Evaluate information and its sources critically

Outcomes: Upon completion of information literacy instruction, students should be able to:

- a. Recognize the different characteristics of popular and scholarly sources, including Internet sources, popular magazines, newspapers, academic journals and trade publications.
- b. Apply criteria to evaluate sources for currency, authority, relevance, accuracy, and purpose.
- c. Identify the best resources for their research.
- d. Broaden or narrow a research topic.

4. Use information effectively to accomplish a specific purpose

Outcomes: Upon completion of information literacy instruction, students should be able to:

- a. Determine if original information need has been satisfied or if additional information is needed.
- b. Investigate differing viewpoints encountered in the literature.
- c. Determine whether to incorporate or reject viewpoints encountered.
- d. Integrate new and prior information, including quotations and paraphrasing, in a manner that supports the research question or thesis.
- e. Use a range of information technology applications in creating the product or performance.

5. Understand the economic, legal, and social issues surrounding the use of information. Access and use information ethically and legally

Outcomes: Upon completion of information literacy instruction, students should be able to:

- a. Define plagiarism.
- b. Recognize the parts of a citation.
- c. Cite a variety of sources correctly in an approved documentation style.
- d. Demonstrate the correct usage of copyright and fair use of copyrighted material.
